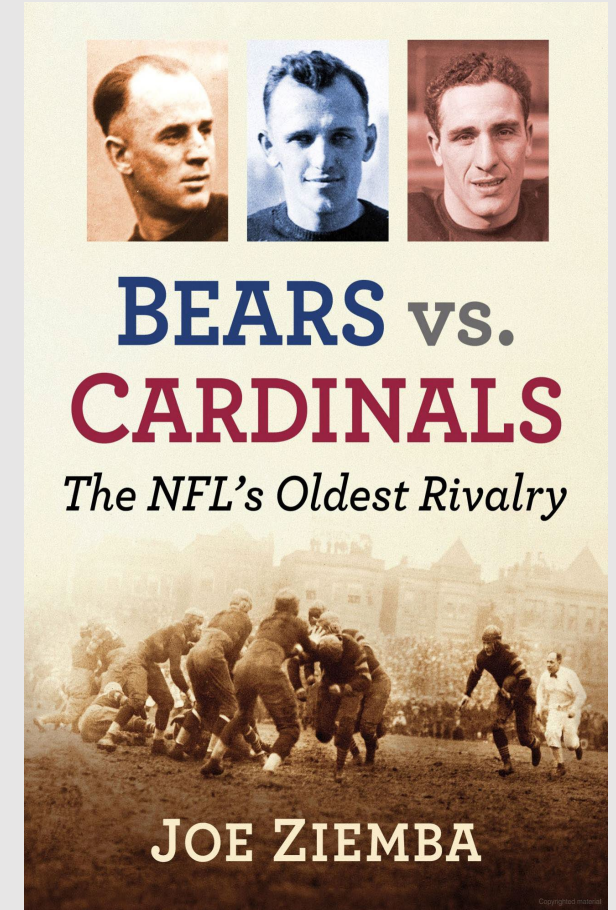
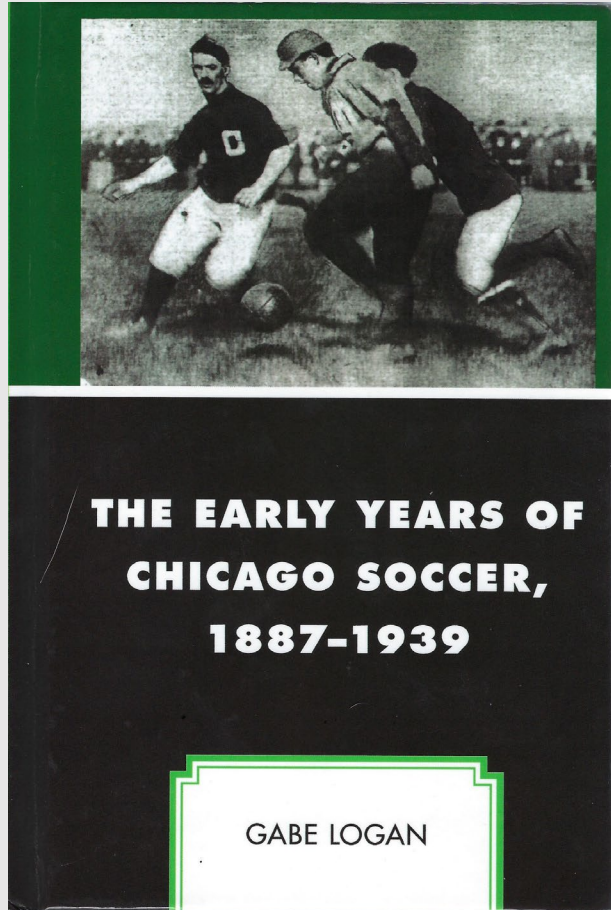

FOOT-BALL.

THE RACINE COLLEGE AND MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY TEAMS

are to play a game of foot-ball at the White Stocking grounds this afternoon, under the Rugby rules, as previously announced. As these rules are not familiar to the foot-ball players of this country they are given herewith:

1. The maximum length of ground shall be 200 yards, the maximum breadth shall be 100 yards, the length and breadth shall be marked off with flags; and the goals shall be upright posts, eight yards apart, with a tape across them, eight feet from the ground.
2. The winners of the toss shall have the choice of goals. The game shall be commenced by a place-kick from the centre of the ground by the side losing the toss; the other side shall not approach within ten yards of the ball until it is kicked off.
3. After a goal is won the losing side shall kick off, and goals shall be changed. In the event, however, of no goal having fallen to either party at the lapse of half the allotted time, ends shall then be changed.
4. A goal shall be won when the ball passes between the goal-posts under the tape, not being thrown, knocked on, or carried.
5. When the ball is in touch, the first player who touches it shall throw it from the point on the boundary line where it left the ground in a direction at right angles with the boundary line, and it shall not be in play until it shall have touched the ground, and the player throwing it in shall not play it until it has been played by another player.
6. When a player has kicked the ball, any one of the same side who is nearest to the opponents' goal-line is out of play, and may not touch the ball himself nor in any way whatever prevent any other player from doing so until the ball has been played, unless there are at least three of his opponents between him and his goal; but no player is out of play when the ball is kicked from behind the goal-line.
7. When the ball is kicked behind the goal-line, it must be kicked off by the side behind whose goal it went within six yards from the limit of their goal. The side who thus kick the ball are entitled to a fair kick-off, whatever they please without any obstruction, the opposite side not being able to approach within six yards of the ball.
8. No player shall carry or knock on the ball; and handling the ball, under any pretense whatever, shall be prohibited.
9. Neither tripping nor hacking shall be allowed, and no player shall use his hands to hold or push his adversary, nor charge him from behind.
10. A player shall not throw the ball nor pass it to another.
11. No player shall take the ball from the ground with his hands while it is in play under any pretense whatever.
12. No player shall wear projecting nails, iron plates, or gutta percha on the soles or heels of his boots.

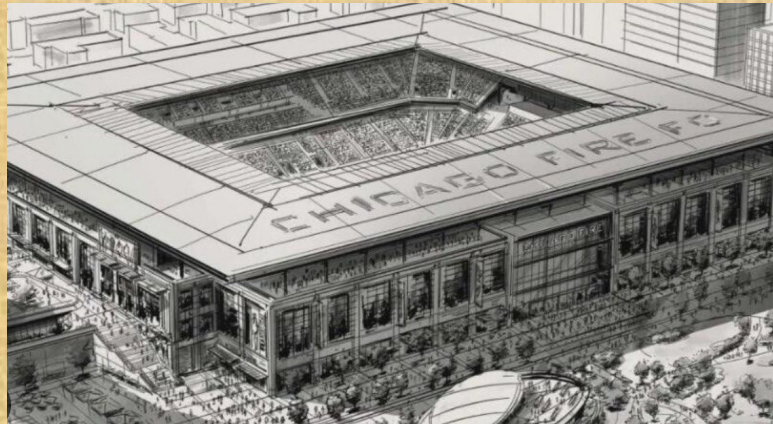

Chronology of Pullman's Sports Teams

19th Century

- 1880's Pullman Athletic Association
 - 1883 Game v Wanderers under Association Rules-First Game? 1879 University of Michigan
 - Cricket club/connection
- 1890's Pullman Cricket and Football (Soccer) teams
- Globally-Teams founded outside "official" British colonies-Barcelona, Genoa in Italy, Slavia Prague, Rosario Central in Argentina
- What was happening culturally in Pullman around sport
 - Soccer team one of the most popular sports-tours east coast to play Fall River, MA



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Pullman's travels to Coal Mining Towns

- 1890's-Braidwood top team-1893 World's Fair competition
- 1899-Championship of "Northwestern States" v Clarke City, IL in front of 11,000
- Pullman consistently playing and recruiting from coal mining communities like Braidwood and Coal City

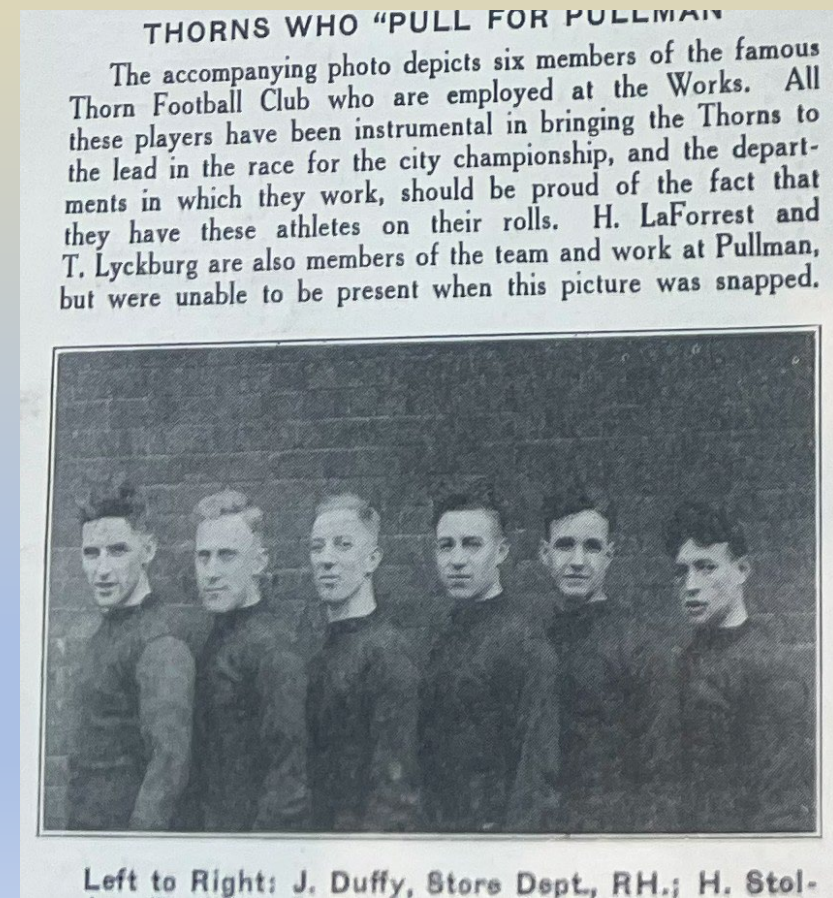
1900's Soccer is Growing by Leaps and Bounds

- International Tours-Galt of Canada and Pilgrims 1905 and 1909, Corinthians in 1911
- 1909 Peel Cup in Illinois-Pullman is most successful
- 1913 US Challenge Cup organized-which gives teams national competition*
- Pullman Builds an enclosed Soccer ground at 103rd Place and Corliss
- 1916-US Men's National Team Scandinavian Summer Tour-Sheldon Govier couldn't afford it
 - April 1916-Challenge Cup Semi-Finals Bethlehem Steel
- 1917-WW I and soccer players from Pullman serve, leaving team limited
 - J.H. "Jack" Cartwright

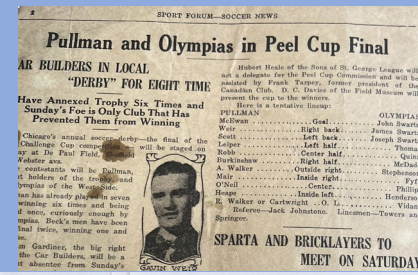


1920-1930 in Pullman/Chicago Soccer

- Post WW I Pullman re-forms
 - Pro-Leagues forming throughout US
- 1923 Pullman HS yearbook-50 students playing soccer
- 1924 Men's Olympic Team is led by Peter Peel
- Nacional of Uruguay to Chicago to play local teams
 - Andrade 1924 Olympic Champion-Sparta Bricklayers
- Insular "ethnic clubs" instead of geographic community: Swedish-Americans, Slavia
- Peel Cup is big drawing card-1927
 - Pullman can't repeat, Coal City beats North Shore
- Pullman not getting support for soccer from Athletic Association-no "Pullman" team after 1929

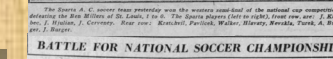


PULLMAN CAR WORKS CHAMPION SOCCER TEAM

Lower row—J. Pollitt, o. r.; J. Black, i. r.; Capt. C. Cartwright, i. l.; and J. Teerling, o. l.



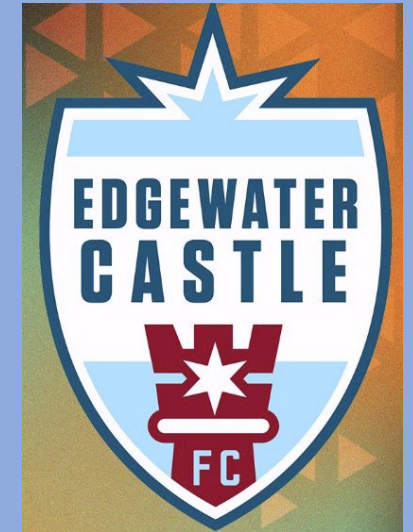
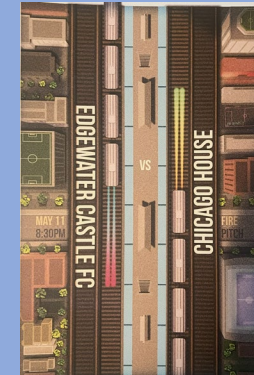
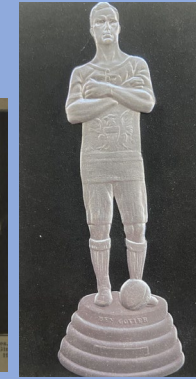
